

Like many Jordanians with Palestinian roots, I exist today because my father was one of the people who survived the events of Al-Nakba (the Catastrophe) in 1948. Sadly however, many Palestinians did not survive and those who did were never able to return to their homes. I grew up listening to many stories about life back then. One of them, shared by my Syrian mother who met the real character after she made it to Syria, struck a chord with me: a young girl who was locked up by her father in a pantry fearing for her life and family honor when the violent events started in Palestine 1948, promising her to come back, but he never does.

I couldn't take that girl out of my mind, I kept thinking of how she felt in this

small dark room, especially because I have a fear of tight and dark places. Over the years, all these stories, people, their lives, happy and sad moments in history came together in my mind, slowly forming the story of FARHA. I didn't want to treat Farha as just a number, one of the 700,000 that were forced into exile, I wanted to focus on her personal journey and dreams that changed from fighting to learn, to fighting to survive, always keeping the war in the background. It's a story about friendship, aspiration, separation, rite of passage, survival and liberation in the face of loss. All seen through the eyes of 14-year-old, Farha.

Any time I thought of her a feeling of suffocation would come over me. The urge to share her story and journey continued to grow. I wanted to convey

this feeling to the audience to allow them to go through this journey with FARHA. This is why I had the majority of the film take place inside a small, confined space where the only connection to the outside world is a high hole in the wall and later on some cracks in the wooden door, and I chose to keep the camera inside with FARHA as we never leave this room for approximately 50 minutes of the film to experience Farha's hopes, fears and transformation, to witness first hand her coming of age.

I was attracted to that challenging setup and I always knew the coloring and sound design would be major components for realizing my vision. This is why they were incorporated in the script early on before shooting, to help deliver the different emotions Farha goes through and the contrast between the different acts of the film. But also, especially in the dark pantry where some moments rely completely on sound.

Directing actors is essential for me. I chose a non-actress to embody Farha through her emotional journey as I believe there is something beautifully raw about non-actors, especially the young, where you can shape them into characters. During our acting workshops I always maintained a fine line between coaching her and keeping something fresh for filming.

Leaving her childhood behind and in spite of Farha's many losses, her liberation from her prison is the ultimate win. She is reborn.



"That remarkable setup struck a chord inside of me, and FARHA started to emerge. Jordanian writer and director Darin J. Sallam holds an MFA in Cinematic Arts from the Red Sea Institute for Cinematic Arts (RSICA), affiliated with the University of Southern

California (USC). To her credit are five award winning short films including STILL ALIVE (2010), THE DARK OUTSIDE (2012) and THE PARROT (2016), all of which received multiple awards and screened in internationally acclaimed film festivals worldwide. A Berlinale Talent 2021, Sallam is the recipient of the 2015

Film Prize of the Robert Bosch Stiftung, the 2017 Artist in Residency Fellowship at La Cité Internationale des Arts and the 2018 Global Media Makers Fellowship by Film Independent. Her debut feature film, FARHA, will have its world premiere in 2021 at the 46th Toronto International Film Festival.
